



Pathway #1 (WCCCD Associate Degree)

High School Student: Freshman High School Students enroll into the WCCCD/DPD Academy Dual

Enrollment Program

DPD Human Resources

DPD Human Resources opens a file on each student, conducts an orientation, and introduces students to their Academic Advisor & Mentor

Participation Hours

Periodic meetings with student's (Academic Advisor/Mentor) **DPD Summer Internship** Program

- If student enters the program in the 10th, 11th, or 12th grade and is unable to catch up and or complete the Associate Degree Program, the student will be eligible for the Criminal Justice Certificate program. This Associate Degree Program provides 65 credits, which will allow for a Detroit Police Officer with 3 years of continuous service to be eligible to take the Sergeant's exam and potentially be promoted. If the student receives (60) credit hours or more he or she will be entitled to a 2% raise for an education incentive per the Detroit Police Officers Association (DPOA) contract.
- If student receive (120) credit hours or more will be entitled to a 2% raise for an education incentive for the Detroit Police Lieutenant and Sergeants Association (DPLSA). Thirty (30) credit hours is a minimum requirement to be eligible to be promoted to the rank of Sergeant (A supervisory rank, which is the higher rank and paygrade than a Detective, Corporal or Police Officer).



Student can apply for the DPD Training Academy, which is 26 weeks (6 mos.) or pursue Civilian Law Enforcement Opportunities with the **Detroit Police** Department.

Program Completion

If student completes WCCCD/DPD dual enrollment classes from 9th -12th, the student will graduate with a HS Diploma and Associate Degree (65 Credits)

JOB OUTLOOK

ABOUT THE PROGRAM

Wayne County Community College District (WCCCD) and the Detroit Police Department partnership is geared towards high school students. The WCCCD and Detroit Police Department dual enrollment Associate of Applied Science degree program is designed to provide the academic and professional training necessary for careers in Law Enforcement. The Law Enforcement Administration option is designed to prepare students for entry or advancement in the criminal justice system.

WHAT DO LAW ENFORCEMENT **OFFICERS DO?**

Law Enforcement officers protect lives and property. Detectives

and criminal investigators, who sometimes are called agents or special agents, gather facts and collect evidence of possible crimes. Law enforcement officers' duties depend on the size and type of their organizations.


WHERE DO THEY WORK?

Officers regularly work at crime or accident scenes and other traumatic events as well as deal with the death and suffering that they encounter. The jobs of some federal agents, such as U.S. Secret Service and DEA special agents, require extensive travel, often on short notice. These agents may relocate a number of times over the course of their careers. Some special agents, such as those in the U.S. Border Patrol, may work outdoors in rugged terrain and in all kinds of weather.

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Recommended Sequence of Courses

Pathway #2 (WCCCD Certificate)

High School Student:

9th, 10th, 11th & 12th grade students are eligible for the WC3, Criminal Justice Certificate program. (31 credits)

DPD Human Resources:

Opens a file on each student, conducts an orientation, and introduces students to their Academic Advisor & Mentor

Participation Hours:

Periodic meetings with students (Academic Advisor/Mentor) DPD Summer Internship Program

Certificate program provides 31 credits towards an associate's degree, which will allow for a Detroit Police Officer with 3 years of continuous service to be eligible to take the Sergeant's exam and potentially be promoted. Thirty (30) credit hours is the minimum requirement to be eligible to be promoted to the rank of Sergeant (A supervisory rank, which is a higher rank and paygrade than a Detective, Corporal or Police Officer).

PAY The median annual wage for security guards and gaming surveillance officers was \$29,710 in May 2019.

JOB OUTLOOK

Employment of security guards and gaming surveillance officers is projected to grow 4 percent from 2018 to 2028, about as fast as the average for all occupations. Overall job opportunities should be excellent, especially for security guards. Within the Detroit metropolitan area, opportunities exist within the casinos, automotive companies, hospitals and corporations.

The Criminal Justice: Public/Private Security Certificate Program provides students with knowledge and hands-on experience in trend analysis, risk analysis, security surveys, and the application of Crime Prevention through Environmental Design. Students will also learn how to address different security related events, conduct site surveys, and utilize proactive security measures. The Program is beneficial to those interested in entering the field, those currently employed in the field, police officers, corrections officers, business owners, architects, retail workers, school employees, operations personnel, and those seeking the knowledge to help secure their environment.



WHAT DO CRIMINAL JUSTICE SECURITY INDIVIDUALS DO?

Criminal Justice: Public/Private Security individuals are responsible for the development, implementation and management of the organization's corporate security vision, strategy and programs. They direct staff in identifying, developing, implementing and maintaining security processes across the organization to reduce risks, respond to incidents, and limit exposure to liability in all areas of financial, physical, and personal risk; establish appropriate standards and risk controls associated with intellectual property; and direct the establishment and implementation of policies and procedures related to data security.

WHERE DO THEY WORK?

Criminal Justice: Public/Private Security graduates work in such areas as private, corporate, business and residential property settings, the Transportation Security Administration (TSA), casinos, automotive companies, hospitals, and shopping malls.
